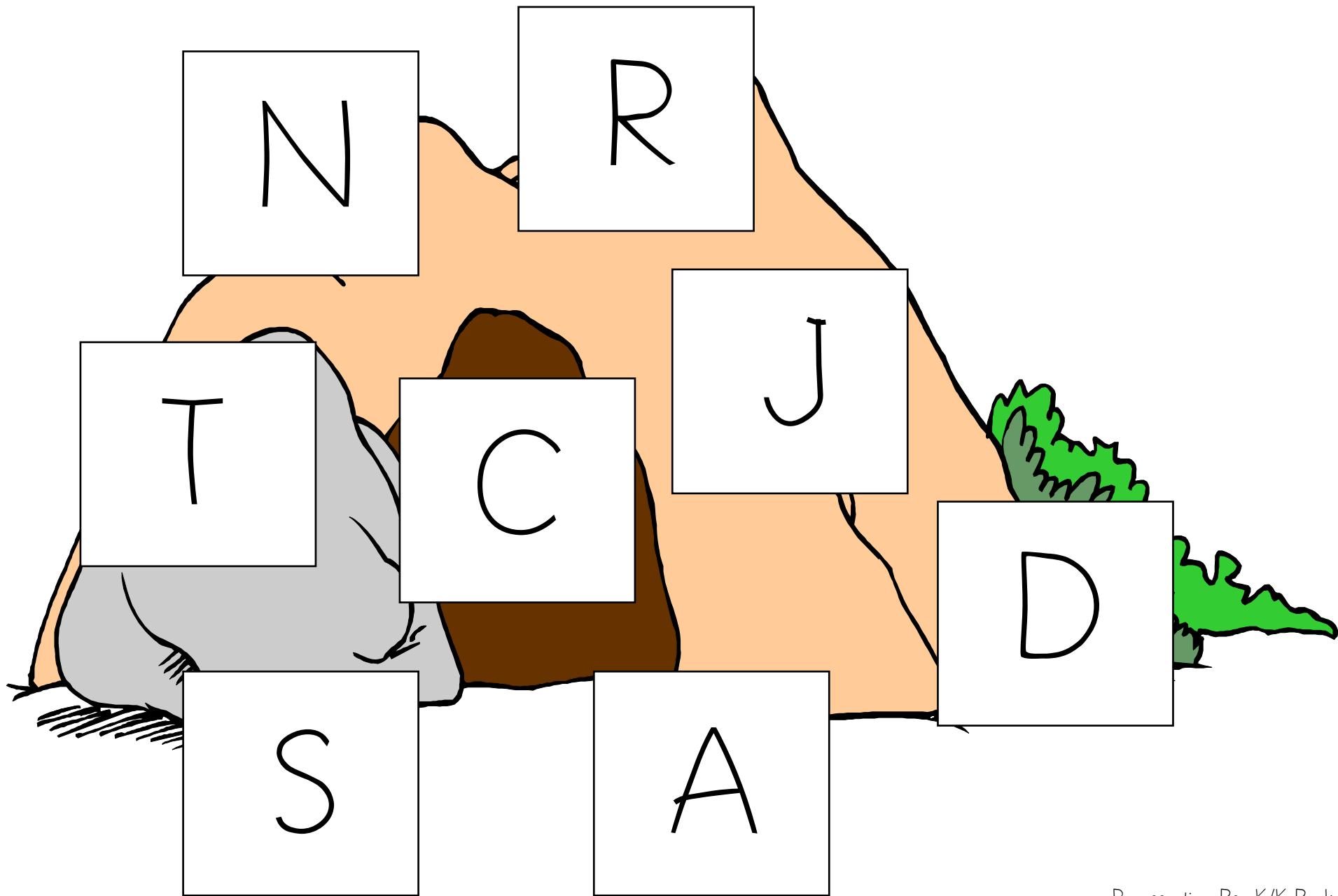
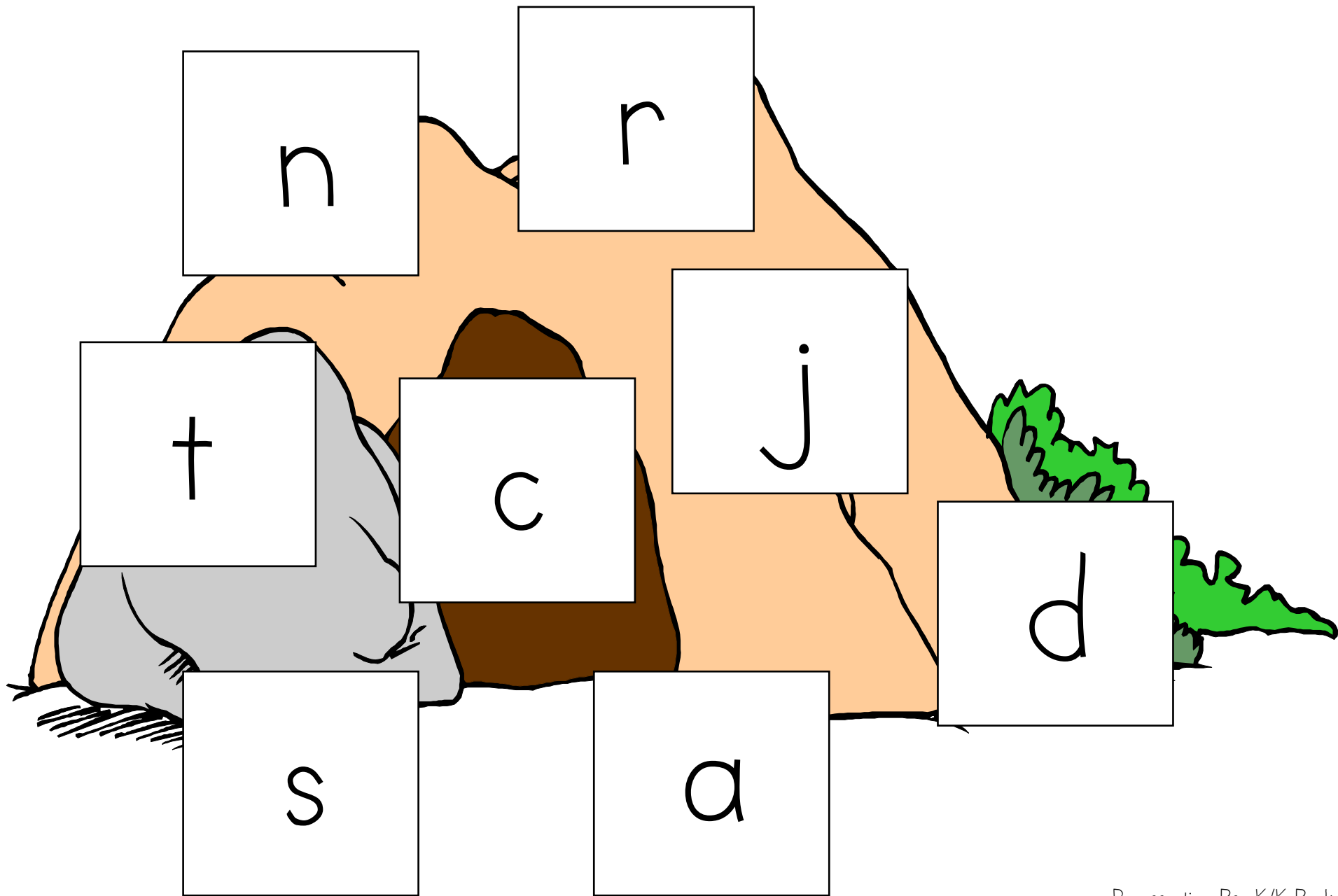

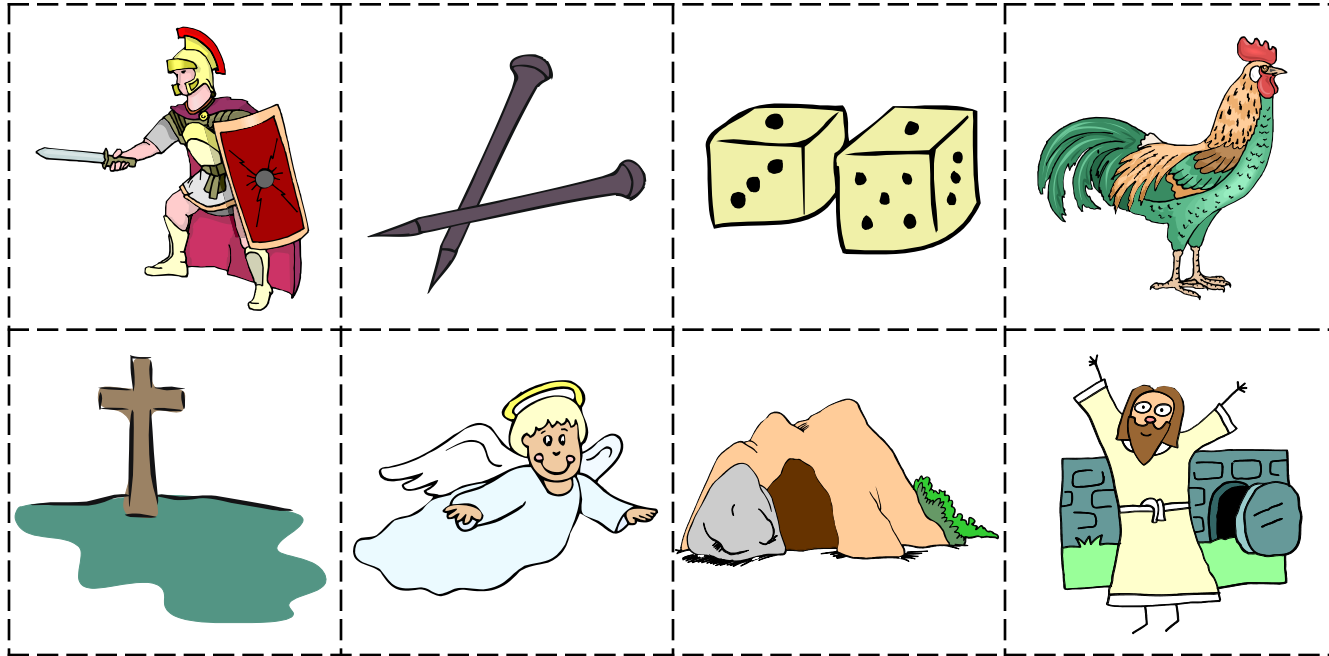

Prep Work:

Print off pictures onto [cardstock](#), cut out, and insert into photo stacking cubes. If you do not have cubes, you can purchase them from www.amazon.com or make your own with dice with a cardboard box (such as a Priority Mail box). You can also adapt this activity without cubes.

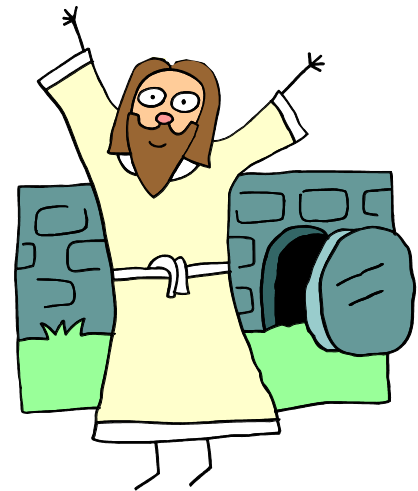
How to Play:

Players take turns rolling the two dice. Players say the name of the objects on the dice and tell if they rhyme or not. If you'd like, you could keep score with each correct answer given; with players getting an extra turn when they roll a rhyme!

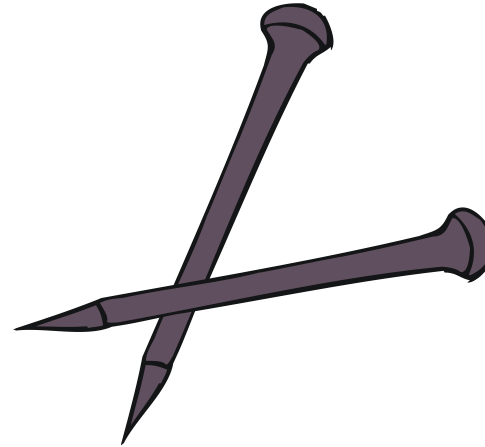
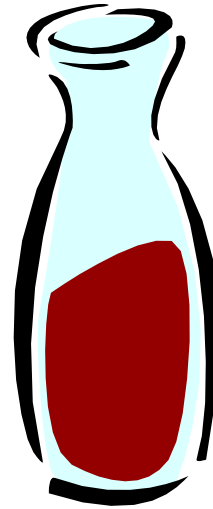
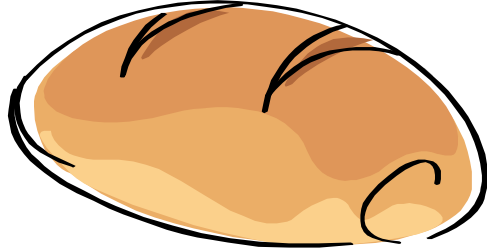
1st Die- bread, wine, thorns, nails, dice, spear

2nd Die- bed, vine, horns, sails, mice, ear



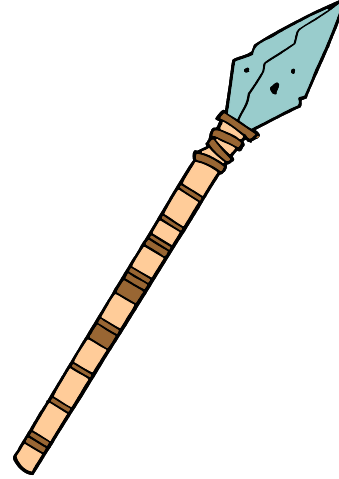
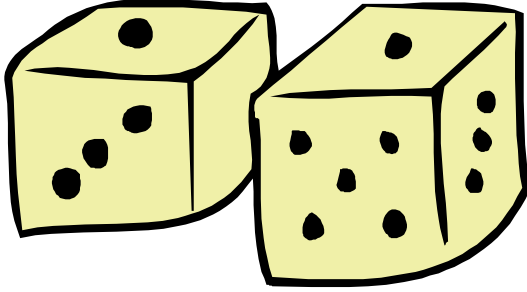

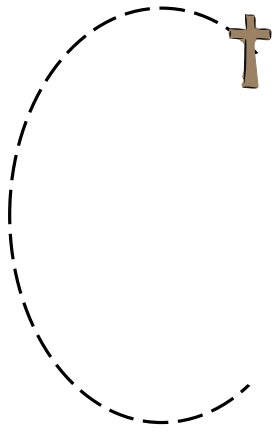
Sunrise Print Awareness

Directions:

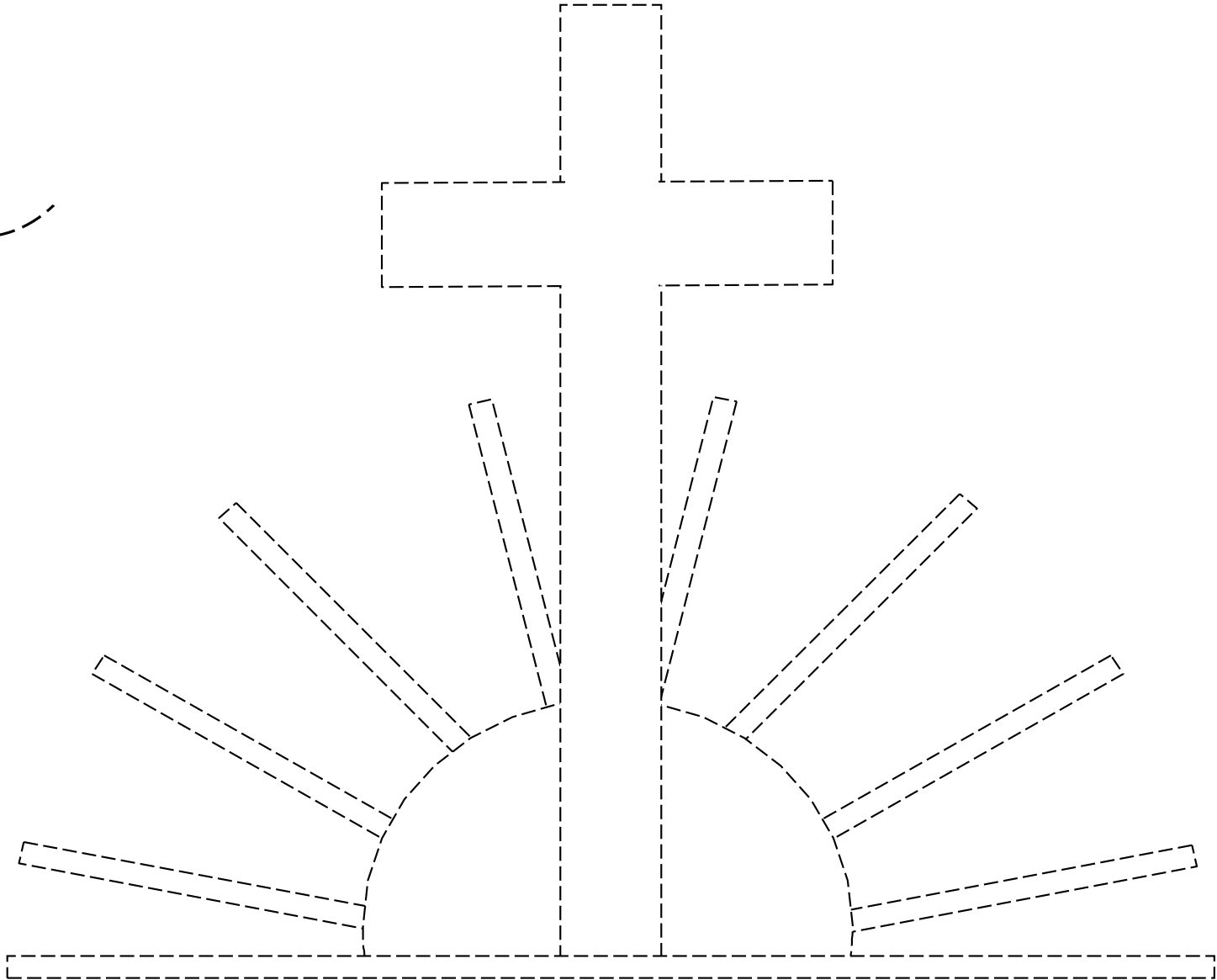
- On another piece of paper, have your child create a sunrise.
- Cut out and mix up this sentence.
- Lay out all the words so the child can see them. Say the sentence in the correct order and let the child help you put them back in the right order.
- Glue them down on the paper under your child's picture, if he would like.
- Read the sentence out loud, pointing to each word as you read it.
- Ask the child to give it a try, too!

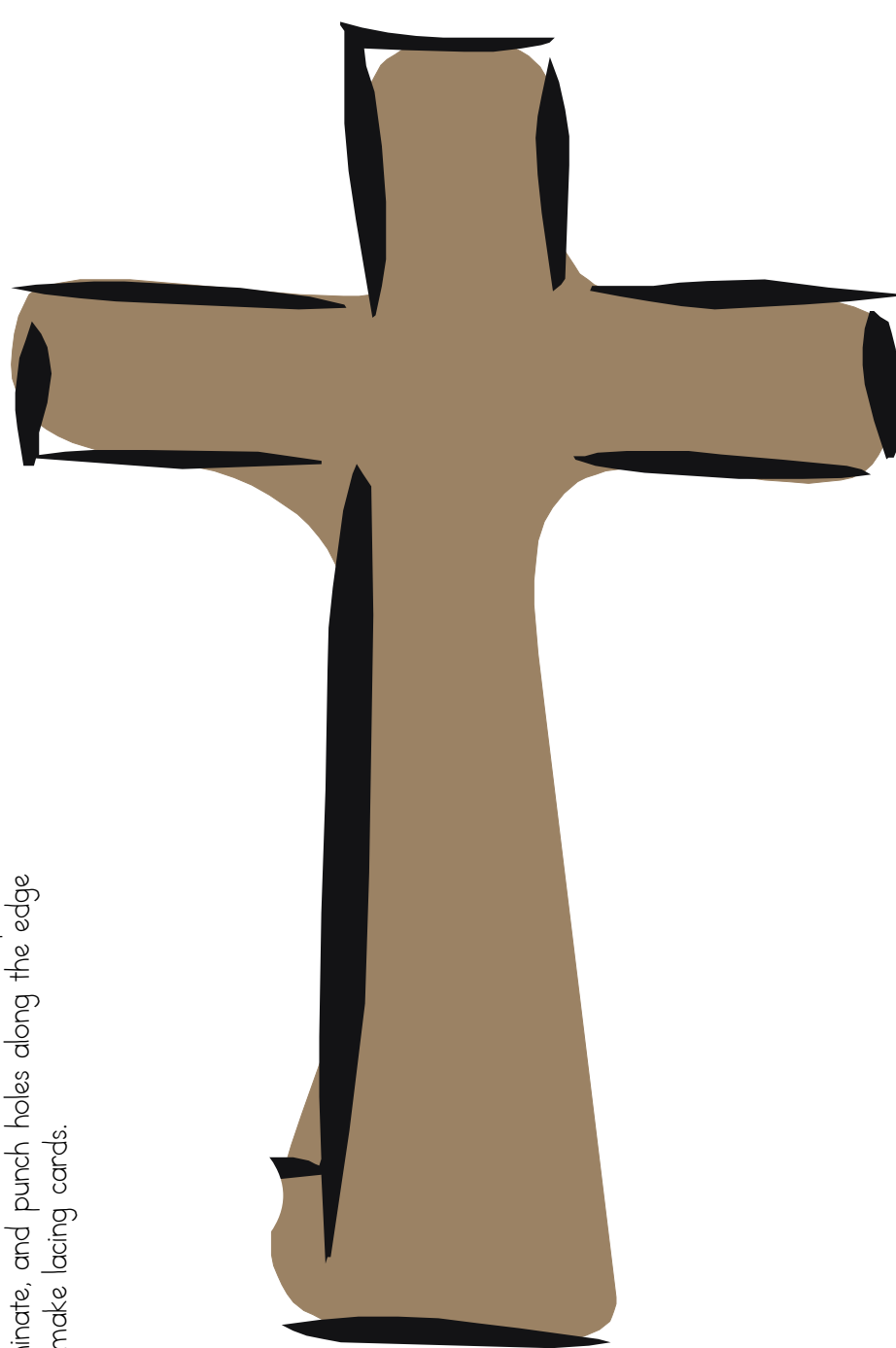


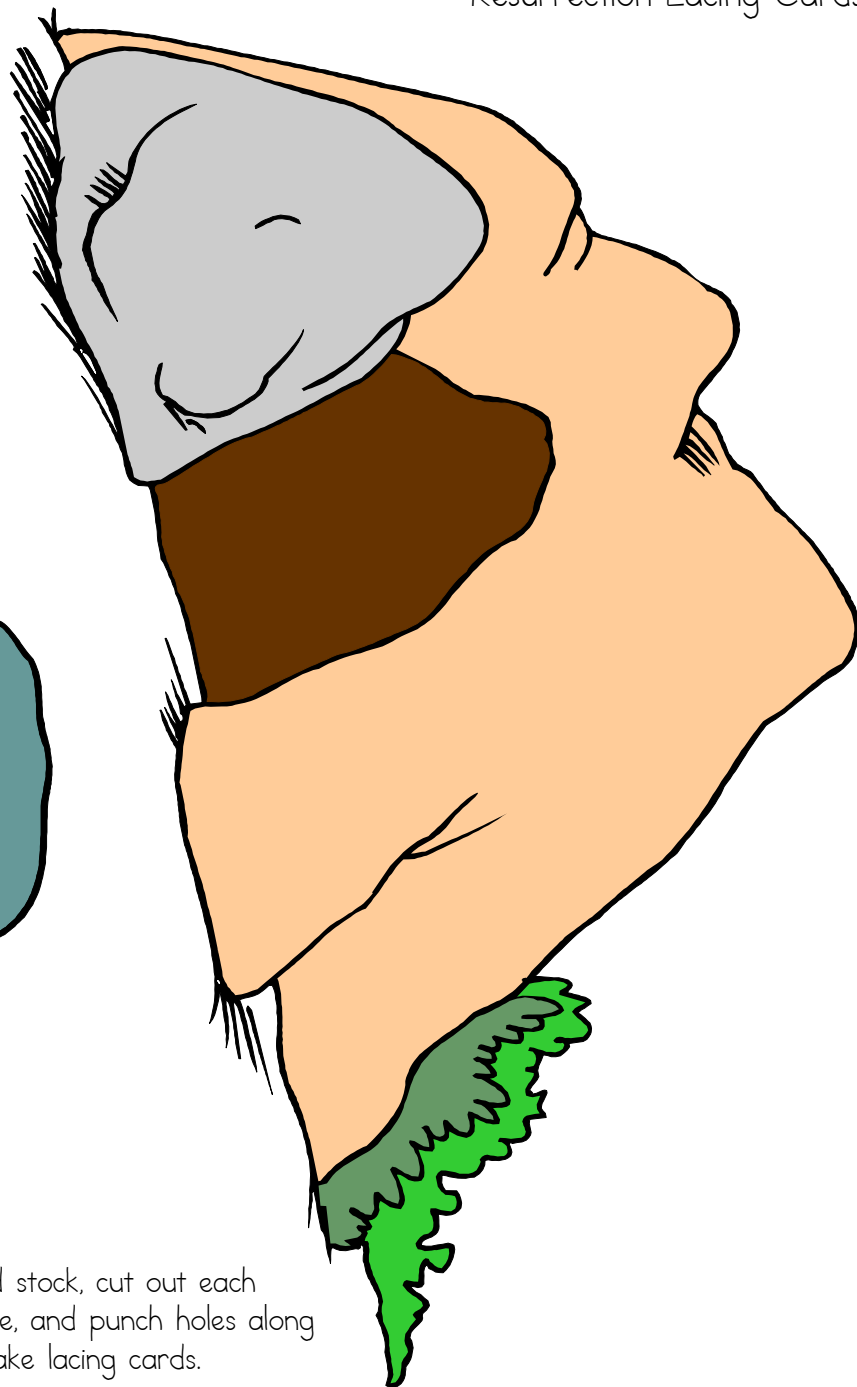
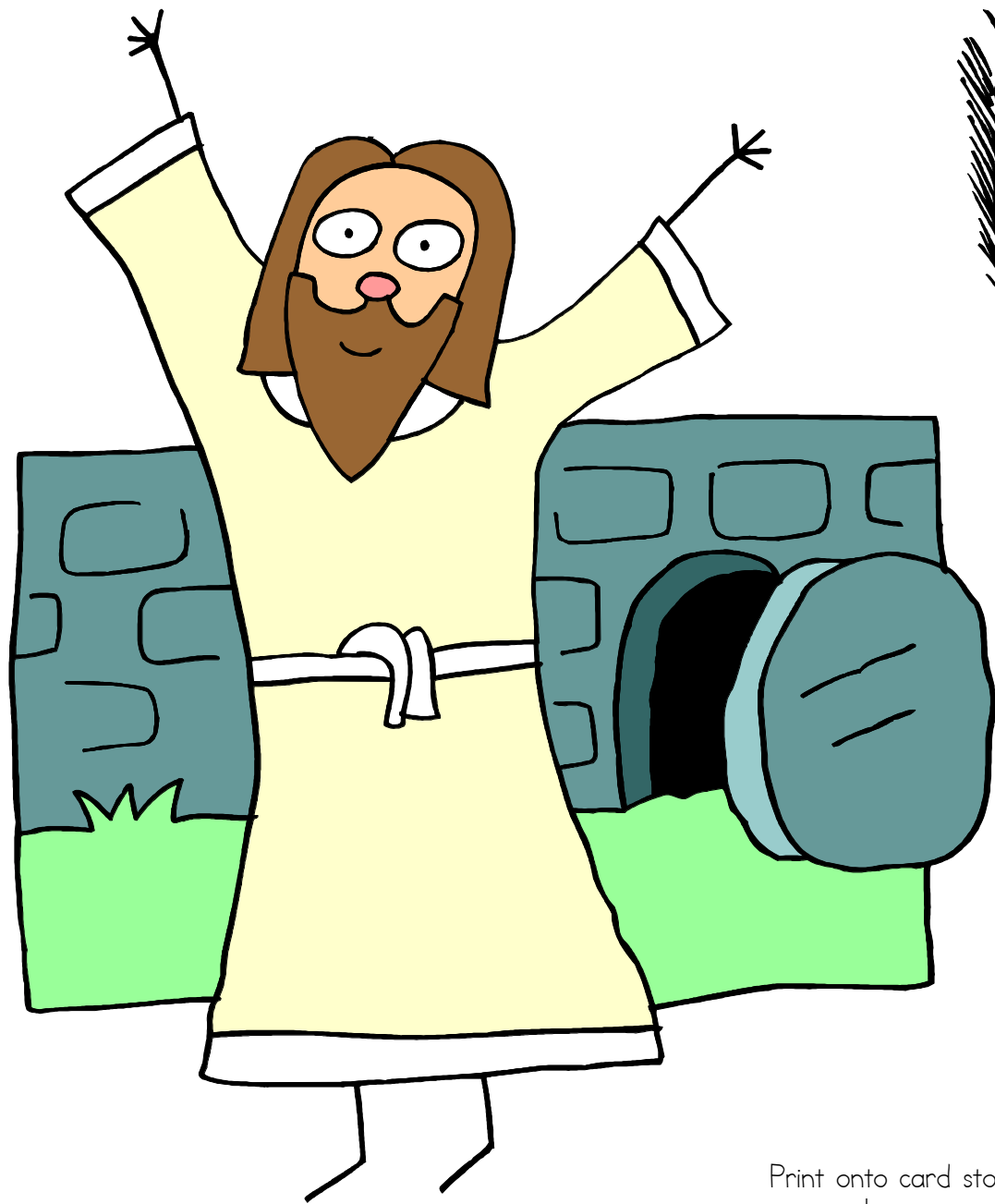

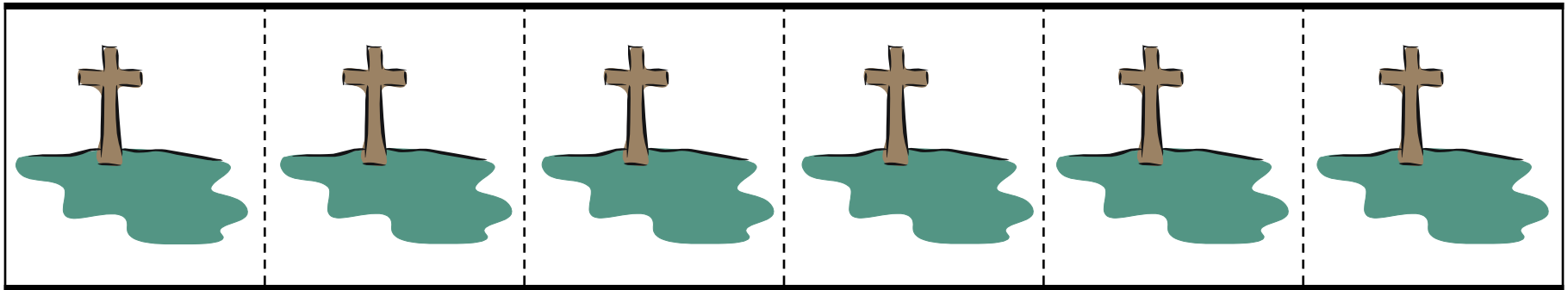


Print onto card stock, cut out each picture, laminate, and punch holes along the edge to make lacing cards.

Resurrection Cut and Pattern

*I recommend printing these onto cardstock to make it easier for the child to cut.

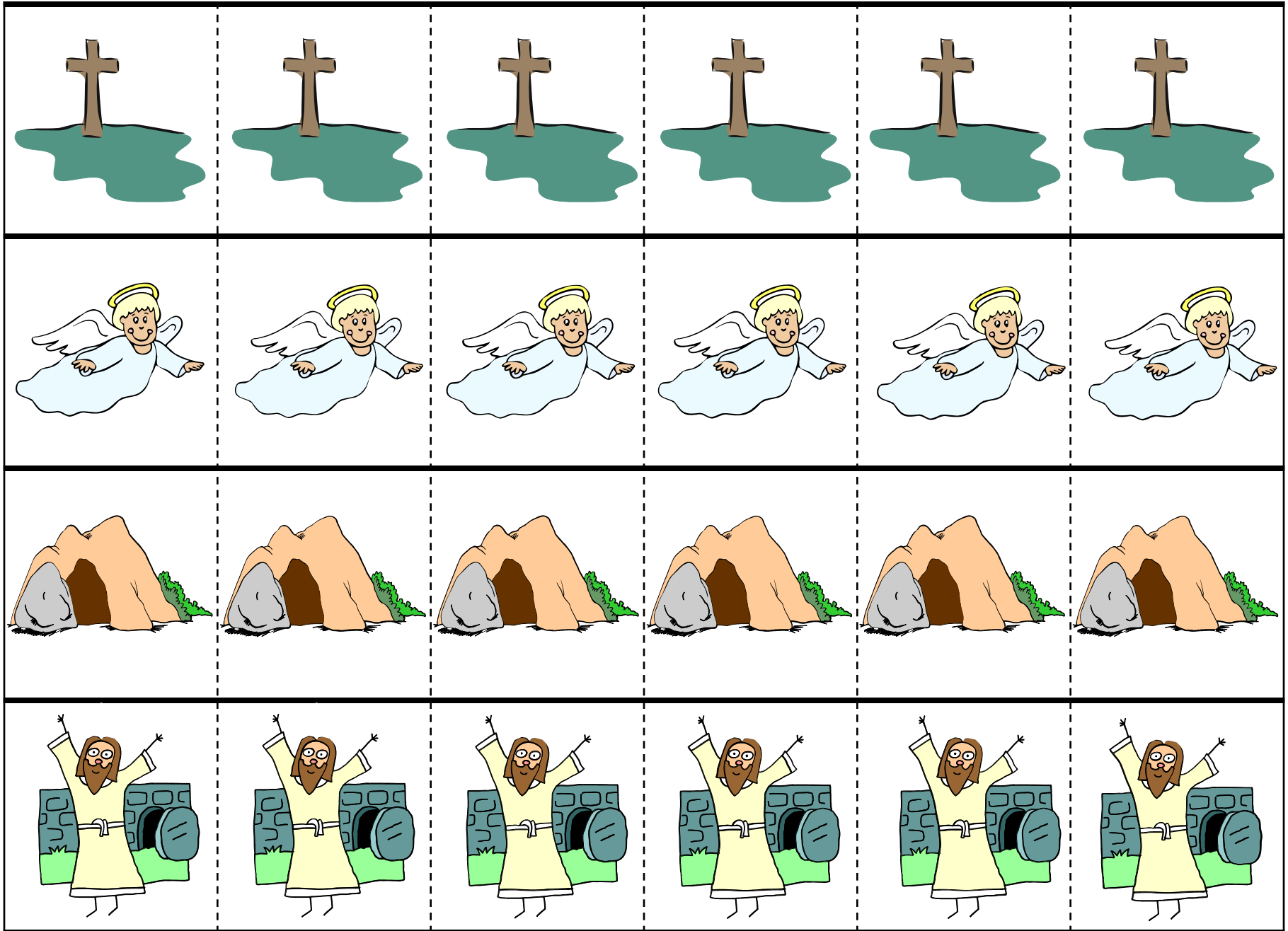
*To prepare for the child, cut along the darker, horizontal lines first to create 4 separate strips. (like the strip below)



*Give the strips to the child and ask her to cut along each dotted line to make six separate picture cards for each row.

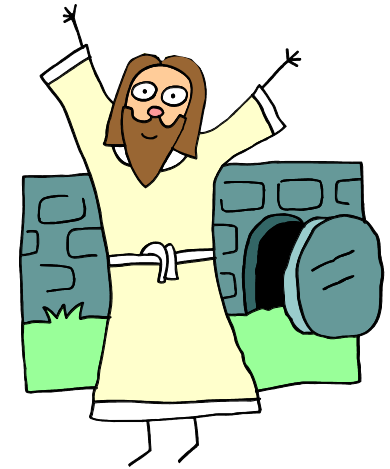
*This can be used as a stand-alone cutting activity OR the little cards can then be used to make patterns together with your child.

He is Alive!

20-Grid



To Prep:

- *Print onto cardstock and laminate for durability.
(Print one cross game board and one Jesus alive page for each player)
- *Cut apart crosses on dotted lines.
- *Locate a die, labeled 1-6.

To Play: (for 2 players)

- *Each player needs a cross game board and 20 Jesus cards.
- *The first player rolls the die, counts the number of dots, and places that many Jesus cards on top of his crosses. For example, if the player rolls a 2, he takes two Jesus cards and changes two of the crosses into Jesus pictured alive on his game board.
- *The first player to cover all of his crosses wins!

Variations: 1- If only one person is playing, he continues to roll and count the dots, placing Jesus cards onto his game board until they are all covered.

2-The Jesus cards can be used as a cutting exercise. Just cut along all the horizontal dotted lines and let your child cut along all the vertical lines.

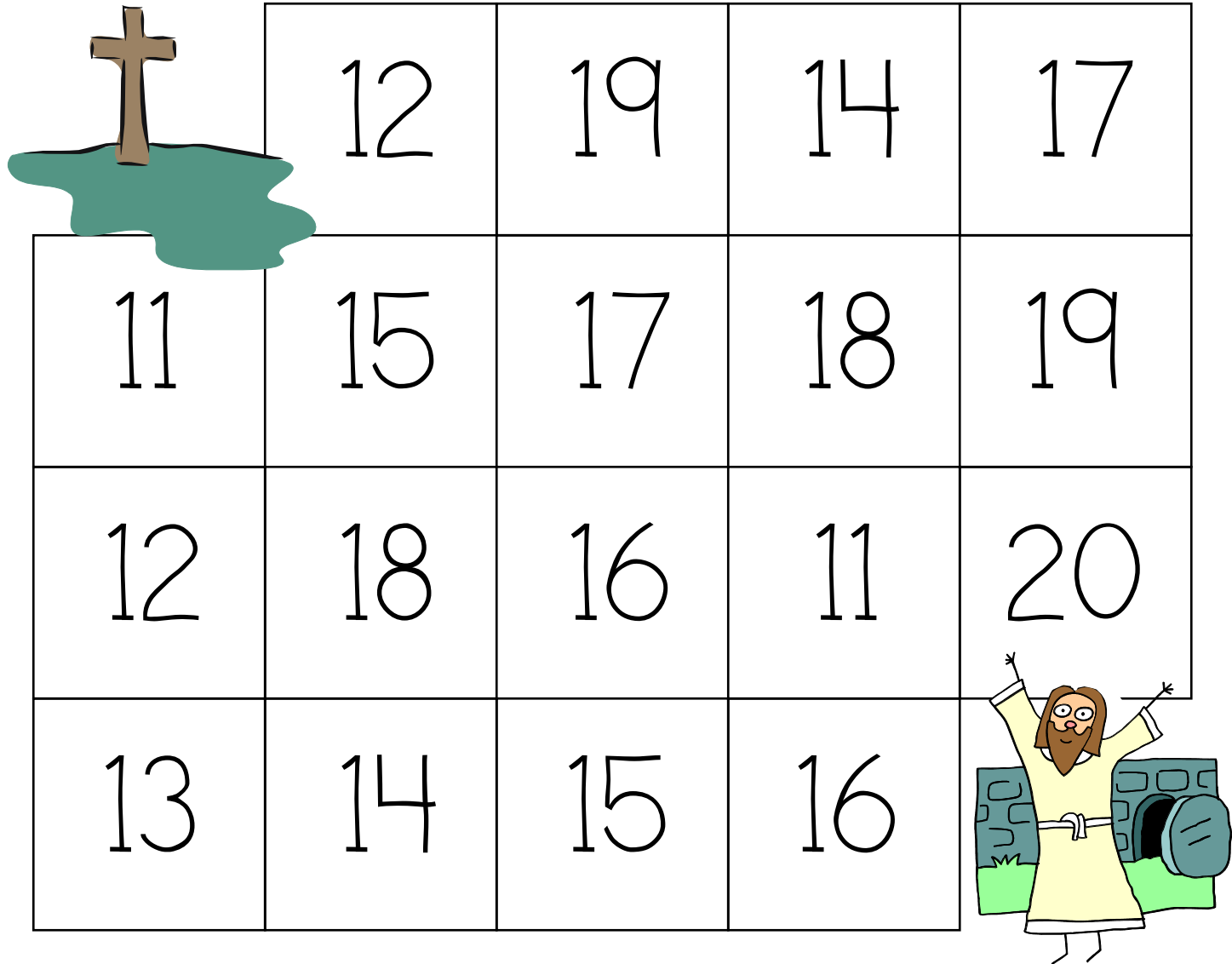
Resurrection Maze

Jesus is alive! Can you draw a path from 1-10?





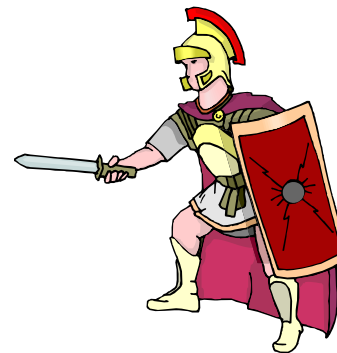


How Many Soldiers at the Tomb?

Print tomb mat, soldiers/guards, and number cards or number tracing cards onto card stock and laminate for durability.

VERSION 1 (easier)

- *Place some soldiers/guards on the tomb mat.
- *Ask your child to count the number of soldiers.
- *Help him locate the number (from the number cards)



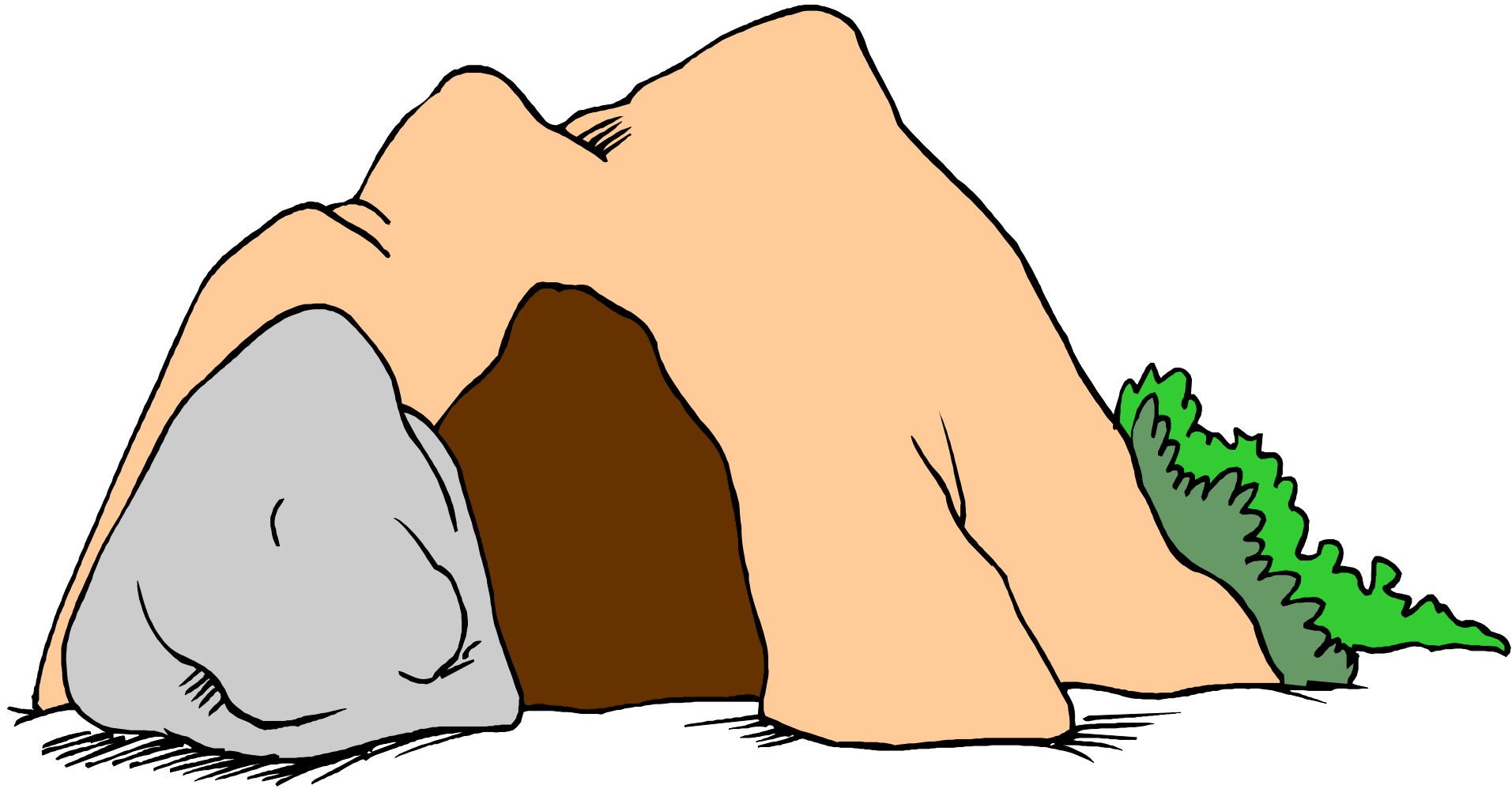
VERSION 2 (harder)

- *Place some soldiers/guards on the tomb mat.
- *Ask your child to count the number of soldiers.
- *Help him locate **and** trace the correct number (with the number tracer cards).

VERSION 3 (hardest)

- *Place some soldiers/guards on the left side of the tomb mat and more on the right side.
- *Pose is as a problem to the child such as "There were 2 soldiers guarding the tomb. Then 2 more came. How many soldiers are there now?"
- *The child solves the problem and locates the number OR locates and traces the number (with the number tracer cards).

Those children who are ready for it could write the number without tracing or write the number sentence!



Cut out the soldiers/guards and use to place on the tomb mat.
