


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The First Thanksgiving Resources

The Famous Thanksgiving


To better understand the story of the famous Thanksgiving, it is helpful to go back nearly one hundred years in English history to the year 1534. King Henry VIII wanted to break free from Rome, so he allowed the Bible to be translated into English. England finally had its own translation of the Bible, and that meant the people could read it for themselves. This became a huge problem for the king, though, for when the people read it, there was a big difference between what it said and what the king said. The king, and those on the throne that followed him, persecuted the Pilgrims and the Puritans, another group that wanted to purify or cleanse the church. Neither of these groups followed England's rules and laws for reading the Bible, worshiping, or prayer.

Because they were caught holding a secret worship service in England, the Pilgrims escaped to Holland in 1608. After living twelve years in Holland, the Pilgrims requested to go to Virginia to join the Virginia Colony, which was already established in the New World (1607).

Two boats departed, but because one of the boats had problems, they all had to return to England. Only 102 passengers left for Virginia on September 6, 1620. Crammed into tight quarters on *The Mayflower*, the Pilgrims faced fierce storms and severe sickness on the 66-day voyage. Once they spotted land, the storms had pushed them to Cape Cod, some 500 miles away from Virginia!

Although blessings would come because of where they had landed, the Pilgrims were now further north, which meant colder weather. Their first winter in New England was harsh and only half of them survived.


In March of the next year, a Native who spoke broken English visited them. His name was Samoset. He introduced the Pilgrims to Chief Massasoit of the Wampanoag tribe. Squanto, another Native who had learned English while a slave in England, taught the Pilgrims survival skills such as planting corn using dead fish as fertilizer and catching eel. Pilgrim Governor Bradford described Squanto as "a special instrument sent of God."



In the harvest of 1621, the Pilgrims had more than enough provisions for the winter! After all God had brought them through, they wanted to set aside time to thank Him for His goodness and blessings. They invited Chief Massasoit, and he brought ninety men as well as deer, wild turkey, and a demonstration of how to make popcorn. This famous Thanksgiving lasted three days and included contests, games, and fun. The Pilgrims had much to be thankful for!










In the chart above, you'll find common foods people eat on Thanksgiving. Draw and write about your favorite food you eat on Thanksgiving.




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
